

CARING FOR WOOL



Caring for wool



Modern wool clothing is easy to care for and many wool clothes can be machine washed. Some wool clothes can also be tumble dried.

Always read the label to know how to best care for your wool clothing.

A few simple rules will keep your wool clothes looking good:

- Turn your wool clothes inside out before washing.
- Separate dark and light colours and wash separately.
- Empty pockets before washing and storing.
- Hang woven garments on shaped or padded hangers in the cupboard and fold knitted garments and store them in a drawer.
- Many wool garments do not need ironing, but if ironing, always use the wool setting, with steam.

Did you know?

- It is best to dry knitted clothing on a flat surface. Woven clothing can be dried on the clothes line.
 - When handwashing wool clothes, always use lukewarm water (about 30°C).
 - After unpacking or wearing, wool clothes may be refreshed by hanging them in a steamy bathroom.
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- Food stains and body oils attract moths. Ensure your wool clothing is clean before putting it away.
 - To remove food odours, lay your wool garment flat on a bed or a towel for an hour.
